December was eventful for both the church and my family. Though we were unable to fund our planned trip to Zambia, we believe God had a purpose in keeping us here. We made the most of the long school holiday, and I took two weeks off to spend quality time with my family. We traveled by train to Mombasa, enjoyed a refreshing week at the coast, and then returned safely to Nairobi. Our vehicle, now five years with us, is no longer reliable for long journeys, so we are grateful for the alternative means of travel, although longer and tiring.



We thank God that our children are now back in school, and we are blessed with a wonderful school nearby. Christmas was a joy as we celebrated with our church families, sharing meals and fellowship together.

On January 1st, we joined fellow pastors and their wives for our annual fellowship. We cooked, prayed, and studied the Word together as we prepared our hearts for the new year. The following Saturday, our church gathered for a special time of prayer and reflection, committing 2026 to the Lord. We trust Him for grace to honor Him in all our programs and ministries.



We also lifted you—our friends and partners—before the Lord, asking that His face shine upon you and that He bless you richly as you continue to serve Him.

Umoja-Mbuyu Preaching Point

As I shared earlier, our Umoja-Mbuyu mission has experienced remarkable growth over the past year. By God's grace, we have already secured a piece of land and are praying for the opportunity to build a permanent home for this ever-growing congregation. The church has begun raising funds locally, and we have already acquired some construction materials. Our goal is to raise a total of \$18,380 to complete the auditorium and an ablution block. We humbly appeal to you, our partners, to prayerfully consider supporting this specific work as the Lord enables you.



About the Umoja-Mbuyu Area

This church is located about 25 km from Nyahururu town, in a community largely made up of subsistence farmers and small business owners. Most of the settlers here were displaced during the 2008 post-election violence. Over 400 families were resettled by the government, each receiving a small plot of land and a temporary house. Many lost everything they had owned in the tribal clashes, and for years they lived with the pain of loss and displacement.

Today, we thank God that many are beginning to settle and rebuild their lives in this new land. Worship gatherings have become a source of hope and healing, and we now have two churches among the IDPs, with Umoja-Mbuyu being the newest. Please continue to pray with us as we minister to these dear people. Our deepest desire is that the Word of God will bring lasting peace to their hearts, especially for those still carrying the trauma of war and death they witnessed.
