THE CHURCH IN BEDMOT TENDING THE GARDEN OF AN ELDERLY MEMBER

The above picture captures the practical application of "brotherly love." A lady now in her 80s in Bedmot village gave birth to 15 children. Ten of them died at various ages for various reasons over the years. The five who are left are scattered across the country, and those who sometimes return often only bring trouble to their mother. One of the daughters passed away and left behind two young children in the care of this elderly woman. The situation is one of intense desperation. Finding something to eat is the greatest challenge. Five years ago, when we started meeting for services under a tree, Mama Helen joined, heard the gospel, and was saved. Her joy in the Lord, in spite of her circumstances, is captivating and contagious. She is the quintessential example of "do all things without murmurings and disputings" (Phil. 2:14). Today, she is too weak to walk to the church for services, but her love for the Lord and the believers has not waned. The condition at home is still dire, but God's grace through the love of the believers is something to count on. The second planting season has begun, and the group of men and women in the picture above are making heaps for sweet potato plants. They have voluntarily left their own gardens to help a vulnerable member of the body. That is love. The reality is that we live in a sin-cursed world in which unfortunate situations will never cease. The horrors we face all around us should not be a trigger for blame and complaint, but a wake-up call to seek the city whose maker is God.

MY ENCOURAGEMENT TO YOU

Has the devil succeeded in silencing your gospel witness? When is the last time you shared the gospel with a non-believer? One of the objections I used to hear as I went around in the village sharing the gospel was this: “Why do I need salvation? I haven’t killed anybody.” There was an assumption among many people, that salvation is only necessary for those who have committed the most heinous and egregious sins like murder. Essentially, the argument was, “I am a good person; therefore, I don’t need forgiveness.” Recently, I have been reminded of this objection. This time, however, it is being made from a positive angle as an attack in the sense that those who are Christians are indeed the greatest evildoers of all time. The accusations hurled at believers today are endless. For this reason, some have retreated into silence, ashamed and afraid to identify with the name of Christ. The Emperor Nero accused Christians of burning down Rome. The same is happening today. Satan, the deceiver of the whole world, and the accuser of the brethren, has not stopped (Rev. 12:9–10). But you must overcome the campaign of suppression. Those who hate Christians, despise the Church of Christ, and undermine the Scriptures will try to dissuade and incapacitate you with a picture of doom. But hope thou in God (Psalm 42:11). Remember what He has said: “If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness” (1 John 1:9). “There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus...” (Rom. 8:1). Paul says, “For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek” (Rom. 1:16). So do not stop. Do not hide. Keep testifying; keep proclaiming Christ wherever you are to whomever you meet. There is no solution to the problems of this world more potent than the gospel of Jesus Christ. Everything else is temporary pragmatism. No matter the century or the location, Jesus is still the way, the truth, and the life. Point them to Him!
